TOP 30th Anniversary: Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025

"Docs: Images and Records"

TOP 30th Anniversary: Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025 – "Docs: Images and Records" will be held mainly at the Tokyo Photographic Art Museum and Yebisu Garden Place over 15 days from Friday January 31 to Sunday February 16, 2025. The festival is organized by the Tokyo Metropolitan Government, the Tokyo Photographic Art Museum operated by Tokyo Metropolitan Foundation for History and Culture, and Nikkei Inc.

This edition of the festival will focus on transformations in media and, by examining a wide range of works through the lens of images and words, will pursue a reconsideration of documents and the concept of documentary.

A document is a record of fact-based information, traditionally in the form of words but more recently also as images such as photographs and moving images. The word "documentary," meanwhile, has come to be used not only as an adjective meaning "factual" or "consisting of documents," but also as a noun referring to a film expressing facts.


The Lumière brothers' *Exiting the Factory* (1895), which is a record of people leaving a factory, is widely recognized as the starting point of the history of motion pictures. People at the time were astonished to see scenes from their everyday lives being recorded and replayed before their eyes as if the events were actually happening right there. Today, 130 years after the invention of moving images, it is entirely unexceptional for people to record and share their daily lives through photographs and videos. Meanwhile, the definition of a photograph has been expanded to include digital images and that of moving images now encompasses digital video; in digital form, these media can be manipulated more freely than before, resulting in a more complex and ambiguous relationship between facts and the images that represent them.

Held on the occasion of the 30th anniversary of the Tokyo Photographic Art Museum, the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025 will extend across all floors of the museum. The program will include exhibitions of works by Japanese and international artists related to performance and the body in forms including moving images, photography, and documents, new works by the finalists of the second edition of the Commission Project, and works from the Tokyo Museum Collection, as well as screenings, performances, live events, talk sessions, and workshops. As such, the program will survey issues of words and images by presenting diverse forms of expression from the nineteenth century to the present and through a focus on archives and the recording of time.

Efforts aimed at making culture and artistic expression easily accessible to a diverse range of people, including further improvements in exhibition accessibility and the provision of sign language interpretation for talks, will be taken to make the festival more inclusive and enjoyable for all. In addition, off-site exhibitions held around Yebisu Garden Place will offer visitors opportunities to experience works closely related to the theme, while places for enjoying a rich and diverse array of artistic and cultural experiences will be provided through partnerships with cultural venues in and around the Ebisu area.



Program



Educational Program

Encompassing events such as workshops and gallery talks, the educational program aims to make the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions more inclusive and enjoyable for all.

Off-site Project (Yebisu Garden Place)

Bringing art outside the museum walls, the Off-site Project will see artworks displayed throughout Yebisu Garden Place. The exhibits will include works by **Tony Cokes**, who is known for taking fragments of text, music, and moving images and placing them into new contexts in his distinctive visual practice.

Commission Project (3F Exhibition Gallery)

The Commission Project was launched at the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2023 with the aim of promoting the works of commissioned artists internationally and supporting their creative endeavors. New works by the four finalists selected last year, **Oda Kaori**, **Komori Haruka**, **Nagata Kosuke**, and **Makihara Eri**, will be presented at the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025.

Exhibition (2F, B1F Exhibition Galleries)

The exhibition will feature documentary works from a wide range of genres, with a focus on photography and moving images, in order to reconsider documents and documentary through the relationship between words and images. The diverse lineup of featured artists will include the likes of Tony Cokes, Liu Yu, who will be presenting works previously unseen in Japan, and William Henry Fox Talbot, Fujihata Masaki, and Sugimoto Hiroshi, by way of representative works from Tokyo Museum Collection.

Screening (1F Hall)

The daily program of screenings will include past works by the Commission Project finalists and a program of films specially curated for the festival based on the overall theme.

Live Event (1F hall / exhibition galleries / etc.)

Performances that transcend the conventional framework of moving images will be held in the 1st floor hall and exhibition galleries of the Tokyo Photographic Art Museum.

Symposium, Special Talk Sessions (1F Hall)

Symposiums and talk sessions welcoming a diverse lineup of panelists will be held to delve deeper into the overall theme "Docs: Images and Records" and moving image archives.

Partnership Program (Affiliated local facilities)

The Partnership Program encompasses exhibitions and various other events developed by art leaders operating in and around the Ebisu area and shown at their respective venues. A sticker rally around the participating facilities is an additional attraction designed to encourage visitors' enjoyment of the festival.

Diversity and Inclusion Initiatives

Aiming to make the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025 enjoyable for all, the Tokyo Photographic Art Museum is taking steps to further improve exhibition accessibility and will provide sign language interpretation for Gallery Talks. The inclusivity initiatives are intended to allow all visitors, regardless of physical or cognitive ability, to go, see, learn, and do as they like at the festival.

Highlights of the Festival

1. Key Words for Exploring Documents and Documentary

In a time when the term "fake news" has become part of everyday life, the line between fact (documents and documentary) and fiction is blurred, making the truth difficult to discern. This state of affairs is also a testament to the extent to which contemporary existence is characterized by a glut of information in the form of images and words. The Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025 will expand upon and delve into the theme of documents and documentary by showcasing the creative works of artists from various eras by reference to key words such as "image," "word," "body," "time," and "performance."

2. The Beginning of "Docs: Images and Records"

The theme of the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025 was derived from the aspects of documents and documentary that connect the new works created by the four finalists of the Commission Project second edition, Oda Kaori, Komori Haruka, Nagata Kosuke, and Makihara Eri. The perspectives that emerge from these works—which delve into themes such as personal and family memories, social issues, the intersection of history and the present, and the nature of the body and space—have shaped the direction of the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025 and form the basis for its entire program.

3. Expanding "Docs" Beyond the Museum

Diverse artworks, mainly in the form of photography and moving images by Japanese and international artists, are displayed in the exhibition galleries. Words and images intersect in these works, which offer opportunities to discover common ground and new perspectives on a range of issues. Meanwhile, works by the American media artist Tony Cokes are exhibited outside the museum, including on the skywalk between Ebisu Station and Yebisu Garden Place and throughout Yebisu Garden Place. This is the first major exhibition in Japan for Cokes, who recontextualizes culture and history in his distinctive visual practice.

Created by the animation and comics artist Hirano Ryo, the character made its first appearance at the 14th Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions. You can expect ye(b)izo-chan to pop up around the festival again this year, accompanying you on a journey through "Docs."





In line with its "Docs: Images and Records" theme, TOP 30th Anniversary: the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025 will welcome American media artist Tony Cokes, known for re-contextualizing culture and history in his distinctive visual practice, for his masterpiece is exhibited first time in Japan. Cokes's works will be displayed both throughout the museum and at off-site venues. Asian artists set to participate in this year's festival include Taiwan's Liu Yu, who will be presenting a spatial installation and video work, Kawita Vatanajyankur from Thailand, who will be contributing a video piece first presented at the last year's Venice Biennale, and the Singapore-based media artist Priyageetha Dia, who challenges dominant narratives through archival and field research, film director Apichatpong Weerasethakul will be contributing a photographic work that takes up the subject of time in moving images. The theme will be explored in depth through the work of Tsunoda Toshiya, who brings about organic spaces of imagery by linking his sculptural thinking with photography and moving images, and Hayashi Yuki, who creates videos by piecing together masses of his own photographs, as well as through an archival exhibition featuring the work of Ito Tari, a performance artist who throughout her career grappled with expressions of sexuality in art, passing away in 2021.

Works from Tokyo Museum Collection to be exhibited include photography by the likes of William Henry Fox Talbot, Julia Margaret Cameron, and Sugimoto Hiroshi, and restored media works by Furukawa Taku and Fujihata Masaki, making for an attractive, border-crossing lineup of art from many different eras. The festival will feature works from a wide range of genres, with a focus on photography and moving images, in order to reconsider documents and documentary through the relationship between words and images. This overall theme also informs the selection of works from the collection, which are displayed with the aim of lending the exhibition additional depth.

Exhibited until March 23 in the exhibition gallery on the 3rd floor will be new works created for the Yebisu International Festival for Art & Alternative Visions 2025 by the four finalists of the second edition of the Commission Project. Oda Kaori will be showing a work exploring human memories through images and sound, while Komori Haruka will contribute a piece considering the nature of documentaries that pass on memories in distinctive ways. Nagata Kosuke will display a complex work with a variety of intersecting narratives based on his research into food and colonial history, and deaf filmmaker Makihara Eri, who approaches her practice by focusing on physical sensations, will present experimental methods in the genre of moving images. The theme of documents and documentaries will be explored through the finalists' personal, social, and historical backgrounds as well as their approaches to the issue itself.

- □ **ODA Kaori** presents a "little film" that captures the past and present life of her own mother. The work turns a personal story—the unknown life of a familiar figure—into a reflection on something universal.
- □ KOMORI Haruka contributes a documentary that tells the story of Hatano Hideto, an activist who has supported the Niigata Minamata disease patients' movement for more than 50 years. Living alongside victims of the disease, Hatano has dedicated himself to a locally rooted cultural movement and practice of mourning he continues to this day. His figure serves as the lynchpin for a narrative that examines the meaning of a life marked by discrimination and hardship while leaving the viewer with hope for the future.
- □ NAGATA Kosuke showcases a moving-image installation that considers the impact of the period of Japanese rule on rice cultivation and alcohol production on the Korean Peninsula. The work provides the audience with a multisensory experience combining video footage, sound, documents, and food.
- □ MAKIHARA Eri presents an experimental project centered on 5005, a workplace for sign language users, that explores new possibilities for moving images. Juxtaposing repeating and one-off images, and mindful of the reactivity between the audience and the images themselves, the work questions how we perceive truth by way of sight and physical sensations.

—Body, Time, Performance

Bodily performances and acts that explore time stand in opposition to the act of recording, and thereby bring reality and the present into sharp focus. The exhibition highlights critical perspectives involving the body and performance: Thai artist **Kawita Vatanajyankur** employs her own body to explore issues of women's labor and consumer society, **Priyageetha Dia**'s distinctive form of visual expression reconsiders the history of labor in Southeast Asia, and the archives of **Ito Tari** showcase this lesbian and feminist activist's efforts to advance the rights of sexual minorities. On the other hand, the medium of moving images can also be thought of as image-based performance, in which an impression of movement is achieved by displaying a series of still images in rapid succession. This aspect will be explored by artists including **Furukawa Taku**, whose investigation of the principles of animation is highlighted by way of his phenakistoscopes (*odorokiban*); **Tsunoda Toshiya**, who brings about organic spaces of imagery by linking his sculptural thinking with photography and moving images; and **Hayashi Yuki**, who creates videos by piecing together masses of his own photographs. Also on display will be *Box of Time*, a photographic work by film director **Apichatpong Weerasethakul** that seeks to connect with the essence of time in moving images.

-Images, Words, Myths

A painting of a pipe with the sentence "This is not a pipe" written underneath it, René Magritte's *The Treachery of Images* challenges the relationship between perception and language by underlining that the "pipe" in the painting is a mere representation, not the real thing. The influence of this work on debates surrounding images and words in the field of visual expression remains strong even today. In the exhibition gallery on the basement floor, the point of departure—as in the Magritte painting—is the difference between images and reality. The meanings of documents and documentary will be considered through the key words of images, words, and myths. The work of Taiwanese artist **Liu Yu** explores the cross-cultural myth of the "Great Flood" and how its imagery has been passed down over time, complementing the exhibition of timeless pieces from the Tokyo Museum Collection—from migrated* and restored works such as the moving-image devices of **Furukawa Taku** and media art by **Fujihata Masaki** to the nineteenth-century works of **William Henry Fox Talbot**.

* Migration refers to the process of transferring systems, data, or other elements to a new environment.

Animation Open Workshop by TOP Volunteers

Using the museum's special kit, a visitor can make "Odoroki Ban" (phenakistiscope) which was invented in the 19th century. With this, an original animation can be created.

Eligibility: Open to everyone (elementary school students and younger must be accompanied by an adult). *No advance application required.

Open Workshop by TOP Volunteers "Card Game: Colors, Shapes, Words"

In the museum's original "Color, shape and word game," players use uniquely shaped colorful cards and cards with various words on them. They share what they feel and/or think and enjoy each other's feelings and different opinions. There is neither right answer nor superiority/inferiority. Children and adults can enjoy this game together.

Eligibility: Anyone who can read hiragana (Elementary school students and younger children need to be accompanied with adults.). *No advance application required.

● Inclusive Written Communication Workshop with Sign Language Interpretation "Docs: Images + Words + Written Conversation"

In this program, the hearing impaired, those who are hard of hearing, and those who can hear enjoy viewing the works together through written communication. By recording images and words with letters and pictures, one might be able to see a new documentary.

Library Night Talk about Artists
